The Priory Church of the Holy Trinity Ingham.

A Brief History

The Founding church in England of the Order of the
Trinitarian Brothers.

A Historically Significant Church.

'For those with eyes to see, all England's history is in its walls'

In 1360 Sir Miles Stapleton and his wife Joan, daughter and heir of Sir Oliver de Ingham, founded a house for the friars of The Holy Trinity,

'The Trinitarians', at Ingham. A church did exist there from earlier times and the village was recorded as Hincham in the Domesday Book.

Sir Miles was granted a licence to rebuild the church and the body of the church was completed in the years leading up to 1360. Oliver de Ingham died in 1343 and his body lies in the founders position in the chancel to the North of the Altar.

The main object of the Trinitarians was the redemption of captives particularly those taken prisoner during the crusades.

By the time they came to Ingham the crusades had already had their day. The order never became important in this country and Ingham, despite its small size soon became the Mother House of the few houses established in England. When The Friary was set up it consisted of a Prior, a Sacristan who also acted as vicar of the parish and two more brethren. It did expand to include six Canons in the ensuing years. Today the Trinitarian order exists in houses in France and USA.

The Friary buildings were to the North of the church and some remains can be seen in the cloister arches, adjacent to the North nave and in the foundations of the Swan Inn.

By 1560 when Sir Thomas Cromwell's men came to Ingham it had ceased to function and so did not need to be suppressed. Legend has it that the brothers with the church plate had left for

St Bennet's abbey on the broads.

The imposing tower is over 100 feet tall. It was completed in the late 1400's when money was still being left towards its completion. It is recorded that in 1488 rector of the neighbouring Parish of Sutton left 6s 8d towards it.

It is topped by a stepped parapet that was added in 1533 .

An East Anglican feature no doubt derived from the churches in the South of France seen by pilgrims en route to Compostella.

It is said that during World War II Ingham and Happisburgh church towers were markers that guided pilots back to their East Anglian airfields. 'See those towers, through between them and nearly home'.

In 1440 the South porch was built. Possibly to be used as a formal gatehouse to the friary. It has three stories and the ground floor has a fine arched ceiling. There are only six other three story medieval church porches in Britain. This now serves as the main entrance to the church.

The large nave was constructed to serve as a Parish church, the Chancel was for the priory. Because of the proximity of the priory to the North there are no windows on that side of the Nave. There are a bricked up doorway and bricked up windows on that side. In the 1600's the church existed as a parish Church. One of the Stapleton daughters married into the Fellbrig family though records do not seem to exist. There is a brass plaque in the chancel recording the Stapleton family at this time and showing the Fellbrig link.

Above the west door there is a frieze of shields. There can be seen the leopard heads for Miles Stapleton and his wife Joan. In the shield to the north is the same shield impaling two rampant lions. It is not clear whose shield this was as the Stapletons had no male heirs.

In the 1700's there is evidence of a church in decline with bricked up windows, even the great West window was filled with clay..

By the early 1800's the church was almost derelict. Its thatched roof was collapsing and the record of services at that time was destroyed in a mysterious fire at the old Vicarage where the body of the incumbent was found. There was no record of church plate or churchwardens.

Then came the Victorian church revival. In 1833 it began with the raising of funds for the major task of restoration that was undertaken by Ewan Christian and J P Seddon and completed in 1876.

The damaged windows were repaired and reglazed and the remaining glass from the East window was put in the new clerestry openings giving welcome extra light to the church. Nave and chancel were reroofed.

The sedilia was practically rebuilt on the pattern of the largely original piscine that is part of the same composition. The medieval stalls were repaired and the pitchpine pews were installed in the nave though some of the old oak poppy headed benches were retained..

The floor was retiled in a pleasing pattern.

The new pulpit made of caen stone and the intricately carved wooden eagle lectern were designed by Seddon. Finally the children of the parish raised £60, no mean feat considering the money values of the time, for the font to be raised on its green and red Purbeck marble pillars on top of a stone platform.

Seddon's and Christians work no doubt saved the church from ruin and the fact that despite the extensive work done it still appears a medieval rather than Victorian building is a tribute to their sensitivity.

A visit to this lovely church is highly recommended. It is open 365 days a year from 9 till dusk.

There is a weekly service at 9.15 each Sunday.
