Farming Diary

Following an extremely dry, hot and drought year in 2022. I suppose it was inevitable the following year would be a wet one! 2023 actually started off guite dry. (Jan and Feb), then it turned wet, delaying the spring drilling of sugar beet and potatoes by a good month.

The winter barley and oilseed harvest started wet but dried out, just in time for the wheat to come in fairly dry, which was a blessing.

October turned out to be, particularly in the latter two weeks, incredibly wet. With 270mm being recorded here, which is over 10 inches of rain! Subsequently all land work ground to a halt.

My old Dad always used to say, 'If it's wet before Christmas, it'll turn dry after Christmas' I think he will be right.

Luckily we have some very clever tyre technology on the tractors nowadays, we can lower tyre pressures down to about 10/13 psi, this equates roughly to the pressure the tyre and tractor are putting down onto the soil, so it really helps in avoiding too much land damage. At these very low pressures the tyre almost looks flat, with a large "footprint" on the soil spreading the weight gently onto the land preserving soil structure.

I'm sure it'll turn dry again soon and we'll all be kicking up the dust again (probably looking for a rain again)!!

I would like to wish all residents of Ingham, a very Happy Christmas, and a Happy New Year.

A Holy Duster may be assigned 'Porch' one week 'Tower' (only the ground floor don't worry), another 'Chancel' or 'nave right' or 'nave left' and so on. You all know we couldn't keep the church so beautiful without your help.

From all of us at Holy Trinity comes a heartfelt thanks for that little stint with brush or hoover, polish or cobweb brush.

The church is a Grade 1 Listed building and it is good to remember that English Heritage deem Holy Trinity Ingham 'a church of historical significance'.

It is indeed a historical wonderment. People have worshipped within its walls since the time of the Domesday book. Built by a Norman Frenchman as a Priory on the site of an old round tower Saxon church. It took three generations to build and the Tower one of the tallest in Norfolk was completed in 1350.

The church was used through medieval times and the Dark Ages, through Tudors and Stuarts Church reformation to Church of England and through Regency and Georgian into Victorian times and seeing the beginning of state education.

People have come to the church for comfort and solace, to pray and give thanks through the wars of the 20th century and to celebrate special ceremonies of Joy or Sadness down the centuries.

Thank you to each and every Holy Duster. We are grateful for your help in keeping this little bit of our heritage alive and clean
