Dear Reader

Be wary the scammer! Soon many of us will be making gift purchases on the run-up to Christmas as we think about our families and friends, but regrettably a minority will be looking to take advantage when you might be more vulnerable. They will try to impersonate a company you deal with or a work colleague, friend or family member. Often the scammer will initiate a phone call or email correspondence with you. They rely on getting lucky and contacting you when your guard might be down. They might try to convince you money is being taken and then offer to help stop it or make time-limited offers that ask you to act quickly. Sometimes they dangle the carrot of a surprise win, then ask for your bank details. Don't hand over money or sign anything until vou've checked someone's credentials and their company's. Never send money to anyone you don't know or trust or use methods of payment you're not comfortable with. Ask for the name of the person who is contacting you and who they represent. Check the information by calling the company's head office or from a real letter that's come through the post. Don't use the phone they called you on in case they've kept the line open, or wait 20 minutes first. If an offer seems too good to be true, it probably is! If in doubt, ask somebody else that you trust before acting.

Farming Diary

Well... to paraphrase old Arkwright from Open All Hours: 'It's been a funny old year'

We started drilling spring wheat in early February, a job that's usually done, five weeks later in March, simply because the conditions were dry and relatively warm. At the time I questioned my sanity, but it turned out to be the right thing to do as it produced a reasonably good yield.

The weather then had a lurch to the unsettled, and we didn't drill beet or plant potatoes, until late April, as the land was just too wet. I remember the pressure was on to get going, and I saw a near neighbour and great friend, standing in his field, debating whether to start drilling beet or not, we stopped for a chat and both felt much better afterwards.

Farming can be a very solitary job and a laugh and a joke helps immensely.

Anyway, everything got planted in the end!

Harvest came and went in between the showers, but modern combines have a huge capacity to cover the ground quickly, invaluable this year.

The swifts, house martins and swallows were a little down in numbers this year. I think the persistent E-NE winds were chilly, and they stayed further south, this year. I hope they managed to rear some young to come and see us next year.

Most of our domestic birds have been moulting in preparation for the cooler months to come and tend to keep a low profile whilst this happens, hence not much in the way of birdsong. But the little robins in my yard have started their lovely singing, which always brightens up the day. It will soon be time to feed the garden birds again, particularly in the coldest times when it keeps them alive.

Nature Notes from Well Cottage

Since the last notes in the May magazine, we have experienced again very changeable weather. The temperatures above and below average, rainfall low in June but high in July and August. This has of course affected our 'wildlife'. There has been a marked absence of butterflies even though the buddleia bushes flowered really well, even the cabbage whites are down in numbers!

Bumblebees and wasps and birds such as sparrows, blackbirds, and robins usually always feeding and either drinking or bathing in the bird baths are not often seen in the garden - usually several pigeons though!! Could these extremes be caused by climate change?

It appears to be a bumper year for blackberries in the hedgerows and although we grow cultivated ones in the garden, there is nothing to compare with the flavour of wild blackberries.

The wrens mentioned in our last report successfully reared their young, but we did not see how many, as they left the nest early morning on Bank Holiday Monday (29th May) before we were up.





The Night Sky in October



The nights are definitely getting darker now as autumn has arrived. The evening sky is getting more interesting with each passing week. The south is dominated by the two gas giants Jupiter and Saturn, rising ever higher from night to night. Around midnight you can already see Gemini and Orion rising in the east, heralding even longer winter nights. My favourite binocular object, the Pleiades (aka The Seven Sisters), rises again around 9pm with the constellation of Taurus. Nevertheless the Summer Triangle is still with us high in the sky with the tail of the Swan (Cygnus) close to the zenith. On a dark and clear night you can see the Milky Way stretch across the sky from Perseus, through the "W" of Cassiopeia, Cygnus, over to Aquila. Soon I will need to start preparing for my second Astronomy Evening at the Village Hall, scheduled for the 2nd of December.
