#### **News from Holy Trinity Church**

#### Dear Friends

Now it's November, we are deep in the season of 'mists and mellow fruitfulness'. Autumn is my favourite time of year. A time for pulling the curtains across, putting my fluffy slippers on and curling up on the sofa with a cup of hot chocolate. It's a naturally reflective time of year.

It's a time of remembering those who have gone before us - those we have known and loved, as well as our sisters and brothers in Christ whom we have never met. It has also become a time to remember the victims of war, as we have done for the last century at this time of year.



How I wish I could say that this year we are celebrating one hundred years of peace. Over the past ten and a half decades hundreds more wars have been fought, and far too many people killed - both people serving in the armed forces and civilians. Millions more have had to flee their homes, in search of peace for themselves and their families. Every day brings news of new turmoil it seems. This cannot be what anyone wants for humanity.

How can we bear it? A world in which human life is seen as expendable, and making weapons is seen as a way to get rich? This is not what God wants for us. But this is not a new problem, we only have to turn to the Old Testament, and other ancient texts to see that humans have been at war with each other for thousands of years.

How, then, can we be advocates for peace? For several years I have worn both a red poppy and a white poppy. This is an expression both of gratitude for the bravery of those who have fought for justice, as well as a hope that one day this world will know peace in every corner. It's a small gesture, and this year I have been thinking about what I can do to turn that hope into reality.

I can't take on multinational arms manufacturers, but I can write letters to those who can engage with them. I can't conduct peace talks between warring factions, but I can try and build relationships with people who hold different views from me. I can't re-home every refugee, but I can support charities who will help them find safety.

What can you do?







The Night Sky in November



It's going to be "The Planets", I think... the topic for my talk on 2nd of December. They are the only objects, apart from Sun and Moon, that move around and can be found in slightly different positions every night. In ancient times astronomers noticed that most lights they could see in the night sky always had the same relative distances to each other (although they all move together in a circle around the North Star). But there were some lights that seemed to move against the background of these. The Greeks called them "planētes asteres" - wandering stars, or simply "planētai" - wanderers. There are five planets orbiting our Sun that can be seen with the naked eye: Mercury, Venus, Mars, Jupiter, and Saturn. They were the only known Planets until the telescope was invented.

In the November sky you can find all planets apart from Mercury and Mars, which are currently too close to the Sun. The chart above shows you the evening sky in midmonth. Jupiter and Saturn can be seen with the naked eye, for Uranus and Neptune you will need a telescope. Venus rises as the Morning Star between 3 and 4am. More about this at my talk on the 2<sup>nd</sup> of December. Hope to see you there!
