#### Editorial


#### Dear Reader,

#### Farming Diary

In my last article I was saying my old Dad's maxim was, "if you have a wet winter, it will start to dry out after Christmas".

Most years that does tend to ring true.

Unfortunately not this year, at the time of writing 22/2/204 we have already had twice our February monthly rainfall average and fields remain flooded.

We managed to harvest the sugar beet in the brief dry spell in January, but the clamps or heaps of beet, still sit on the fields, waiting for the haulier to clear them, as again too wet for him to get on the land.

I always was a little sceptical of climate warming, but the weather patterns are changing, as is my opinion! With a scorchingly hot and exceptionally dry 2022, followed by a wet and cold (for the most part) 2023, in fact we recorded just shy of twice our annual average rainfall in that year.

We have of course had wet and dry years before, but I have never seen the land so wet and flooded like this in my lifetime of farming.

The current Government seems to place food production and a secure food supply at the lower end of its priorities, in favour of us growing wild flowers or re-wilding the land.

Whilst there is of course a place for these policies I think this is a foolhardy way to go and reminiscent of the way things were 100 years ago, policies that led to the Agricultural depression of the 20's and 30's.

The Government seem to think they will import the food, but with similar extreme weather events occurring in Western Europe, it has hit their food production hard as well with little exportable surplus.

Anyway, let's hope for some warm and sunny weather (I think we're all in favour of that)!!

We can get back on the land and start to catch up with the backlog of work, which will be lovely, and get things growing again.

It was interesting to watch a sparrow in the back garden pulling a piece of dead foliage at least 4 times its length across the garden and then disappearing into the hedge, no doubt building a nest.

The snowdrops and aconites had a very short flowering period, probably affected by the weather. But in contrast, the Camellias seem to thrive on it. They have flowered earlier and are still full of blooms.

A really large bumble bee was seen on 14th March, perhaps tempted out by the slightly higher temperature!

#### Dear Friends

Easter is guite early this year - although it can be earlier. My grandparents' wedding anniversary was 24th March and they were married on Easter Sunday. Of course, it's very easy to work out when Easter is - it's always the first Sunday after the first full moon after the Spring Equinox - simple! That's the reason it moves about a bit because it's bringing together the solar calendar and the lunar calendar, which don't line up exactly. And it follows the lunar calendar because it's linked to the Jewish festival of Passover. The events of Easter are told with the Passover celebrations of Jerusalem in the background. Jesus was Jewish of course, and so he would have been familiar with the rhythms of the Jewish year and its festivals. Pesach (the Hebrew name for Passover) celebrates the release of the Israelites from slavery, and those themes are picked up in the Christian feast, as we celebrate our liberation thanks to the sacrifice Jesus made for us. We are freed from the hurts, habits and hang ups which have held us back, we are filled with the hope that the possibility of new beginnings brings us. We see that all around us as the natural world wakes up from the slumbers of winter - I am always grateful to live in a part of the world where we have these wonderful seasons. The crocuses, daffs, and new leaves are unfurling all around us from ground which looked empty and branches which looked bare just a few weeks ago. As we spiral round through the seasons of nature, and the seasons of the Church year, we are reminded each year that we can experience new life in ways we might find it difficult to imagine, but that promised to us by the God who loves us, who loves this wonderful world, with a love which is more powerful than death. 

#### The Night Sky in April



Now that spring has arrived and the nights get ever shorter, you have one last chance to catch a glimpse of a "dirty snowball", or a "long haired star" as the greek word "comet" translates. The comet in question is called 12P/Pons-Brooks and it is rather faint, so you definitely need binoculars to see it.

At the beginning of the month it can be found just after sunset above the western horizon to the right and slightly below the planet Jupiter. Jupiter should appear around 8pm about 20° above the western horizon. Then you have to wait a bit longer for the twilight to darken before you will have a chance to spot the comet. The earlier in the month you try, the better, as Pons-Brooks is moving into the southern sky and will vanish below the horizon soon. The chart above shows the evening sky on the 10th around 8:30. The Moon is only 2 days old and will only be a thin crescent close to Jupiter and the comet. Even if you can't spot the comet it should be a beautiful sight. The chart also shows how Jupiter and Pons-Brooks move across the sky over the first two weeks of the month.

Third Quarter: 2<sup>nd</sup>, New Moon: 8<sup>th</sup>, First Quarter: 15<sup>th</sup>, Full Moon: 24<sup>th</sup>
